A BUGGY army brandishing heart-shaped balloons protested to save their beloved Lewisham Hospital, campaigners launched their legal challenge against the plans.

Protest co-ordinator Vicky Penner. whose three-year-old son Sam was saved by hospital staff, said: "The mums are keen to persuade Mr Hunt to re-think his attempt to vandalise the excellent, financially successful much-needed Lewisham hospital.'

The 41-year-old, who lives off Shooters Hill Road, said: "The

She said: "There is no way I would have made the trip to Woolwich.

"I think I would have died.

"My daughter found me on the bathroom floor.

"I was rushed into hospital and

had surgery straight away."

Jessica Ormerod, 34,
praised staff for deli who delivering her three children safely, said: "My

daughter had her cord around her neck, her heart rate had dropped.

"I was very tired and losing quite a lot of blood.

"It is very frightening the idea I would have had to transfer to any hospital

"Woolwich is a long way, no matter what the nonsense numbers they used.'

The protest was followed by a rally staged outside Lewisham Hospital last Friday with speakers including Mayor of Lewisham Sir Steve Bullock.

LEGAL FIGHT CHALLENGES PLANS

● THE legal fight against Mr Hunt's proposals is intensifying with a second challenge launched by Save Lewisham Hospital Campaign. It will be on the grounds the four key criteria set by Mr Hunt and announced in the House of Commons on January 8 were not met before the decision was made - support from GP commissioners, public and patient engagement, clarity on clinical evidence and

consistency with patient choice. There are just two days left for Mr Hunt to withdraw his decision before Lewisham Council launches legal action.

The council says the South London Healthcare Trust administrator did not have powers to make recommendations for neighbouring Lewisham Hospital.
